
TEN ESSENTIALS – What you should have with you on a hike...



2019 September VHF on Mt. Fremont-W7W/RS-005. The team of Rich-KR7W, Mike-W7MKE, Chuck-AC7QN and Pat-WT7N (who took the photos) operated the September VHF contest from the summit of Mt. Fremont in Mount Rainier National Park. They used the club call WW7LW. Here's the story from Rich:


We did operate from the official SOTA summit of Mt Fremont...but only as VHF Contest participants. It was too complicated (at least for me) to keep two logs at 7,000 feet at 39 degrees in the fog. So in 2019 we only did VHF Contest logging – however, it did count for those SOTA Chasers that worked us.

On the right: AC7QN, W7MKE, KR7W attempt to respond to a CW CQ call heard on 432MHz. The CQer did not respond back. This was the only CW signal we heard during our outing.

Over the three hours we spent at summit there were 28 144MHz QSOs (SSB + FM), 20 50MHz SSB QSOs and six 432MHz SSB QSOs. Rigs used were a Yaesu FT-817 for 144 and 432MHz; an Elecraft KX3 for 50MHz SSB; and a Kenwood D72 for 146MHz FM; all radios at five Watts. All antennas are Home Depot PVC pipe + welding rod + aluminum angle stock – made to fit into a pack.



Keeping an Eye Out for Equipment Failures

Our equipment is used in the field and leads a hard and sometimes short, life. Here's a reminder to pay attention. My EFHW tuner was eratically connecting to my rig – if I wiggled it just right it would work. When I opened it up I noticed that the pin on the BNC looked longer – in fact, it had been pushed into the tuner almost a quarter-inch, no longer making consisent contact. And the BNC mounting bolt was no longer tight and could rotate. Therefore the wire connecting (circled in red) was actually broken and just touching the pin. Check your gear! Before it hip checks you!
